

**The words *who* and *whom* and *who's* and *whose* are often confused.**

- Use *who* as the subject of a sentence.

**Who** made the cake?**Who** will clean up after the party?

- Use *whom* as the object of a verb or preposition.

Whom did you invite?

To **whom** did you send invitations?

- Use *who's* to mean "who is."

**Who's** bringing the balloons?**Who's** going to take you home?

- Use *whose* to show ownership.
