# **5TH AND 8TH GRADE TRANSITIONS**

Beatrice Middle School is supporting the current 8th and 5th grade students as they make the transition to a new school for the 2019-2020 school year. Change is always a concern for students as they begin a new career at a different school building. Moving from a familiar location to a bigger and more diverse school will bring new and different challenges for students.

During the month of March, Tracy Post and Jennifer Prososki, the BHS counselors, met with the 8th grade students to explain the registration process for high school scheduling. They reviewed with students the necessary courses needed to graduate and go onto a post-secondary school. Next year's classes have been selected and registration completed.

To allow 8th grade students the opportunity to see BHS during a school day, they had lunch and took a tour of BHS conducted by student council members. Beatrice fifth grade students met with BMS counselors and administration during the month of April. The counselors and an administrator went to each elementary building and described what a 6th grade student's day will look like. The counselors described classes students attend, supplies they will need, and activities they can be involved in. During the visits, the administrators talked about three areas of concern that most 5th grade students have. The concerns are: not being able to find their classrooms, opening their locker, and how to go through the lunch line. To ease their concerns, students are invited to BMS to tour the building and have lunch at the school. To find their way around the building, all incoming 6th grade students and their parents will be invited to an orientation at BMS prior to school starting. Information regarding 6th grade orientation will be mailed to you. Change can be a concern to students and parents. BMS is working with the students to help them make the adjustment to Beatrice High School and Beatrice Middle School as smooth as possible by providing opportunities to see the buildings during the day and ask questions. If you have questions about the transition, please feel free to contact BMS.

# **SUMMER SCHOOL AT BMS**

During the month of June, BMS students will have the opportunity to participate in a summer school program; which is designed to strengthen academic skills. Students that have been recommended by a staff member will be invited to participate in the summer program, invitation letters should be in the mail soon. Summer school will run from June 3 to June 27, Monday through Thursday, from 8:30 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. Numbers are limited so please contact the school as soon as possible.

# STUDENT'S FUTURE IS SET THANKS TO 529 PLAN

When Lyle Harms was just one year old, his parents, Linda and Leonard, opened a <u>NEST 529 College Savings</u> account for him. "We wanted to give our son the opportunity to have the education we didn't have," Linda said.

The Harms, who run an antique tractor restoration business near Paxton, Nebraska, deposited \$100 into the account and set up monthly contributions of \$50. "There were times when we almost couldn't afford that, but we made it our responsibility and we stuck with it," Linda said.

## Five years = \$5,000

After five years, the Harms hit their first goal of \$5,000. That's when they upped their monthly contribution to \$100.

Their main goal was to have \$20,000 saved by the time Lyle graduated from high school. Linda said her husband, who is "pretty smart about investing," selected the NEST investment option known as "<u>Age-Based Aggressive</u>" and stayed with it.

When the Harms hit \$15,000, they lowered their monthly contributions back to \$50.

So, did they meet their \$20,000 goal?

## Savings goal met!

Lyle graduated from Paxton Consolidated Schools in May 2018 with \$23,405.86 in his NEST account. The money the family saved – along with seven scholarships Lyle earned – will more than cover the full cost of his education at Mid-Plains Community College in North Platte where he enrolled in the Diesel Technology program.

"He loves it," Linda said. "He is at the top of his class."

## The cost of college

Linda said the cost for Lyle's first year of college (tuition, room and board, and books) was about \$5,000. "If it wasn't for saving in the NEST 529 plan, I don't know what we would have done."

Lyle also brings in income – and is gaining valuable experience – through a part-time job at Mid-America Diesel in North Platte.

Linda said Lyle looks forward to being a diesel mechanic, something he's wanted to do most of his life. "Our son is very mechanically inclined – a skill he learned from his parents," she said. "We're very proud of him."

The Harms will have money left over in their 529 account after Lyle graduates from college. They plan to put that money toward their future grandchildren's education.

## Don't think you can afford to save?

"We want to inform parents that it doesn't take too much to save each month for their child's future," Linda said. "You don't want your child to be paying on student loans into their fifties. Who wants their children to have the burden of being in debt for almost half their life?"





# NOTES FROM THE NURSE



We are down to the last few weeks of school. If your child has medications in the nurse's office, including prescription and "as needed" meds such as Tylenol or Ibuprofen, they will need to be picked up and taken home. I will be sending notes to students the last week of school requesting this be done. Parents may stop by to pick up their child's medication if they prefer. Students MAY NOT take the medication home on the last day of school. ANY MEDICATIONS NOT PICKED UP WILL BE DESTROYED AFTER NOON ON MAY 23rd.

### \*\*REMINDER\*\*

Any current 6th grader going into 7th grade needs a physical and current Tdap vaccine before school starts in August. Physicals and proof of vaccine are due in the nurse's office BEFORE the first day of 7th grade. \*\*If we do not have proof of vaccine and physical on file the first day of school your student may be excluded from school on a medical exclusion until Tdap and/or physical is completed (per Nebraska Law (79-444) and State Stature 79-4,171; 7904,117(1)(b); (2),(3).\*\* Any student wanting to participate in a sport in the 2019-2020 school year will need a sports physical dated after May 1st before participating (7th grade physicals count towards sports also, so no need to get a sports physical if your child had a 7th grade physical).

# WASHINGTON D.C. HERE WE COME!!!

Washington D.C. and historical Gettysburg will be the site of a five day / four night educational tour for 64 Beatrice Middle School 8<sup>th</sup> graders, teachers, and adults. Worldstrides Educational Tours and 8<sup>th</sup> grade History and Civics teacher Michael Policky are sponsoring the trip. Students will see Mount Vernon, George Washington's home, the White House, the Holocaust Museum, Arlington National Cemetery, and other sites in the Washington D.C. area as well as Gettysburg, the famous Civil War battlefield. Policky noted the reason for sponsoring this trip is to provide students with a once in a lifetime opportunity to experience the history, culture, and government of our country's great capital and the early beginnings of our country. The group travels to the east coast from May 28<sup>th</sup> –June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019. Please watch for emails and notices of meetings for further information. A student meeting will be held on Thursday, May 16<sup>th</sup> from 3:15-6:00 PM and a parent meeting will follow from 6:00-7:00 in room 202.

Beatrice Middle School 7<sup>th</sup> graders and parents also recently held meetings for the kickoff to the 2020 Washington D.C. and Gettysburg trip scheduled for May 26<sup>th</sup> –May 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Early registration discounts were available for the 5day/4 night trip. Cost of this year's trip with discount is \$2,235.00. Besides the discounted fares, it allows students and parents additional time to work and pay off the trip. Those who sign up should also ask about Flag Scholarships that help pay for the trip. This trip is open to 8<sup>th</sup> graders (2019-2020 school year), parents, and older siblings who did not have the opportunity to go to Washington D.C. but who would still like the chance to gain the experience and education associated with such a trip. There are currently 100 people signed up for this trip. The most ever!

Students who are currently in the elementary grades and 6<sup>th</sup> grade are encouraged by Mr. Policky to establish a savings account and to begin saving for the 2021 trip and those trips beyond. The tentative dates for the 2021 trip are June 1<sup>st</sup> – June 5<sup>th</sup>, 2021. With some hard work, the desire for learning, and the ability to save, anyone can make this trip a reality.
